## Missouri knocks off Memphis

Big 12's Tigers are now one win away from reaching the Final Four.

GLENDALE, Ariz. — A career night by J.T. Tiller put Missouri one win away from its first trip to the Final Four. Memphis' 27-game winning streak, meanwhile, is history.

Tiller scored a career-high 23 points — 15 more than his season average — and Missouri held off Memphis' frantic rally for a 102-91 win Thursday night in the semifinals of the West Regional.

Third-seeded Missouri led by 24 points four minutes into the second half, then Memphis closed within six with 2:14 to play. Mizzou won it at the foul line.

Missouri (31-6) advanced to play top-seeded Connecticut on Saturday.

"We came out and kind of took the fight to Memphis early on, and before you know it, our guys had a little confidence," Missouri coach Mike Anderson said.

Dynamic point guard Tyreke Evans scored 33 for second-seeded Memphis (33-4). The Tigers shot only 18-for-32 from the foul line. Last year,

a poor showing at the foul line cost them dearly in an overtime championship game loss to Kansas.

Missouri freshman Marcus Denman had the game's most jaw-dropping basket, a swish from three-quarters court at the halftime buzzer for a 13-point lead.

Tiller, the co-defensive player of the year in the Big 12, made 10-of-16 shots and had three steals. All five Missouri starters reached double figures. DeMarre Carroll scored 17 and Leo Lyons had 15 points and 12 rebounds.

Lyons was 11-for-18 from the foul line but made four straight in the final 1½ minutes. In all, a whopping 77 free throws were taken, with Missouri making 30 of 45.

Robert Dozier had 19 points and 16 rebounds in Memphis' first loss since a Dec. 20 setback against Syracuse. Antonio Anderson scored 18 in

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — While the rest of the world was busy condensing Friday night's Oklahoma-Syracuse Sweet Sixteen matchup to Blake Griffin versus the 2-3 zone yesterday, Austin Johnson stumbled onto a very big secret.

"I'm not really worried about us scoring the ball with Blake," said the Sooners' point guard. "I think it's going to come down to if we can stop them on defense. If we can do that, I think we'll win the game."

A look at Syracuse's hour-long practice inside the FedExForum Thursday showed how hard that will be. A look at one player, really.

Jonny Flynn, the Orange's 6-foot point guard, turned a layup drill into a dunk show. It ended when he stood at the top of the key, one-bounced the ball toward the rim, took off

## New challenges facing Talons as the 2009 season begins

Almost everything is new for the Tulsa Talons — new home, new artificial surface, new uniforms.

Team operators Paul Ross and Henry Primeaux even have new partners. Ross said that's good, because af2's winningest franchise is

facing new challenges.

Will the long-awaited move to the BOK Center generate enough fan interest to offset the higher cost of doing business in the new arena?

That question will start to be answered at 7 p.m. Saturday when the Kentucky Horsemen visit to kick off the 2009 season.

"If we could average 5,000 in

paid attendance, that would put us in good shape," Ross said. He and Primeaux have run the team since buying it in 2004 from current Tulsa Oilers hockey owner Jeff Lund.

Ross's attendance goal might be hard to reach. The Talons have never failed to average at least 5,000 per game. But past attendance figures have counted tickets given away or

used for promotional purposes, and didn't necessarily equate to an actual body count. Ross said the Talons never have averaged 5,000 paid.

Others feel an attendance surge will naturally accompany the move to the new building. Count John Bolton, BOK Center general man-

## Villanova pummels Duke

BOSTON — Dante Cunningham scored 14 points with 11 rebounds and third-seeded Villanova beat Duke for the first time in more than 50 years, taking advantage of the Blue Devils' poor shooting to win 77-54 Thursday and advance to the NCAA regional final.

The Wildcats (29-7) will play Big East rival Pittsburgh (31-4), the top seed in the East, on Saturday for a trip to the Final Four.

Duke (30-7), which spent a week at No. 1 in the nation earlier this season, failed to reach the round of eight for the fifth consecutive year.

Kyle Singler scored 15 and Jon Scheyer had 13 for the second-seeded Blue Devils. But Scheyer and Gerald Henderson combined to make 4-of-32 from the floor, as Duke shot a season-low 26.7 percent on field goals.

Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski, already the winningest coach in tournament history, became the all-time leader in NCAA games coached with 93 — one more than Dean Smith, though the current format with six full rounds has only been in place since 1985. But it became obvious early on that he wouldn't be padding his lead.

After jumping to a 5-0 lead, Duke gave up the next 11 points and never led again. The Blue Devils trailed 26-23 and hit the first basket of the second half, but Villanova scored 12 of the next 13.

Worse, the 3-point shooting that got Duke past Binghamton and Texas abandoned the Blue Devils against the Wildcats. After making 45 percent and 50 percent of their 3s in the first two tournament games, Duke hit three of their first 18 and 5-of-27 overall.

The Blue Devils had beaten Villanova five straight times since the Wildcats' last victory in 1958.

Former OU signee Scottie

Reynolds scored 16 and Reggie Redding had 11 points and nine rebounds.

**Pittsburgh 60, Xavier 55:** LeVance Fields pointed Pittsburgh in the right direction just in time — as usual.

For the second straight game, the orchestrator of the offense took the big shots himself, hitting a 3-pointer with 50.9 seconds left, then scoring off his steal as the top-seeded Panthers reached the regional finals

for the first time in 35 years with a 60-55 win over Xavier on Thursday night.

One more win and they'll be headed to Detroit for the Final Four.

"We came in expecting to win two games," Fields said before acknowledging the obvious: "It was dramatic."

The star point guard provided the drama in Pitt's previous win, 84-76 over Oklahoma State. That game was tied at 74 with 2:42 left. Then Fields made a layup and a 3-pointer and the Panthers never trailed again.

Pitt (31-4) knows the late-game strategy by now.

"Give LeVance the ball," DeJuan Blair said with a laugh.

The last time Pitt was in a regional final was in 1974 when it lost to eventual national champion North Carolina State and star David Thompson 100-72.

"It definitely was big for the players, the coaches and the city," said Sam Young, who led Pitt with 19 points.

## TALONS BIOS

**Justin Allgood, QB:** Has 20-1 record as Talons starter, completing 64.3 percent of his passes. Led the team to the 2007 ArenaCup title and was 11-1 last year before breaking his collarbone. Started two years at Central Oklahoma, becoming second-leading passer in school history.

**Yancy Boatner, OL/DL:** Two-year starter at Baylor. Part of Dixie (Utah) State's third-ranked junior college squad in 2003. Two-time high school All-Stater from Hamilton, Texas.

**Anthony Bolden, OL-DL:** Part of Talons offensive line that allowed league-low 12 sacks last season. Also caught three TD passes. Earned All-af2 honors with Stockton Lightning in 2007.

**Carlos Campbell, DB:** Former Notre Dame cornerback had 17 interceptions in his first two af2 seasons. Signed briefly as undrafted free agent with Tampa Bay Buccaneers in 2005. Two-time high school All-Stater from Hampton, Va.

**Terrance Carter, DE:** Set a franchise record with 11 sacks last season. Also the Talons career sack leader with 16½ in two years. Kansas native was a two-year starter at Colorado State.

**Brian Crum, FB/LB:** A four-year Florida Gators letterman, was part of the 2006 national championship team.

**Maurice Cummings, OL/DL:** Played 35 games in four OSU seasons, totaling 36 tackles (8½ for loss) as a senior.

**Zac Edwards, WR/DB:** Former Jenks High All-Stater was part of two state championship teams. Totaled 3,320 receiving yards and 21 TDs in collegiate stints with Central Oklahoma and NWOSU.

**Antwan Floyd, OL-FB:** Collegiate defensive end has become a premier pass protector in five Talons seasons. Played on TU's 2003 Humanitarian Bowl team.

**Carlese Franklin, WR/DB:** Two-time All-Southland Conference selection for McNeese State, had 1,751 career receiving yards. High school All-Stater in football and basketball at Kentwood, La.

**Roderick Green, OL:** Earns money as a long-haul trucker when not blocking for the Talons. Returns for his third season. Was an All-SWAC selection for Arkansas-Pine Bluff.

**Jermaine Hope, DB:** Has 16 interceptions in three Talons seasons, tied for No. 2 on franchise career list. Second-team All-WAC cornerback for TU in 2004.

**Jeff Hughley, WR-KR:** No. 3 in Talons career TDs with 67 in two seasons. Broke franchise records last year for all-purpose yards (3,144) and kickoff-return yards (1,363). Had four TDs in 2007 ArenaCup win over WB-Scranton. Set school receiving records at Averett (Va.) University.

**Kamau Jackson, FB-LB:** Four-year af2 veteran led Austin Wranglers with 295 rushing yards last year, scoring 13 TDs. Also had 31 tackles. Played college football at Mississippi State.

**Jermaine Landrum, WR:** Has 1,285 receiving yards and 28 TDs in three Talons seasons. Former TU standout best known for his catch and TD sprint at Rice in 2003.

**Luke Phillips, K:** Franchise career leader in points by a kicker (391). Former Metro Christian Academy standout walked on at OSU and finished his college career as fourth-leading scorer in school history.

**Jamar Ransom, LB-DE:** Had career-best 88 tackles last season, along with four forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries. Led OSU in tackles with 99 in 2005 and was a second-team All-Big 12 selection.

**Delenell Reid, DB:** Has 23 interceptions in four af2 seasons. Made pivotal 52-yard fumble return in Talons' 2007 ArenaCup win over WB-Scranton.

**Brett Rayl, OL-DL:** Played eight games at center before a knee injury cut short his rookie Talons season. Former OU lineman went to 2007 training camp with AFL's Dallas Desperados.

**Michael Shack, FB-LB-DE:** Dependable blocker and utility defender, has 63½ tackles and 10 rushing TDs in three Talons seasons. Played college football at Arkansas-Pine Bluff.

**Larico Stevenson, WR/DB:** Had 56 tackles and one interception for af2's Lubbock Renegades last year. Played college football at Division II West Georgia and finished with 10 career interceptions.

**James Welker, QB:** Served as LSU's scout-team quarterback for three years. Part of the Tiggers' 2007 national championship team.

## TALONS Q&amp;A

**I've never seen an arena football game. What's so hot about it?**

It's a fast-paced game with lots of offense and no shortage of intensity. That's especially true in af2, where the athletes receive minimum pay. Most are motivated by a desire to improve their stock with pro football scouts, or play simply for the love of the game. Almost everyone plays hard and almost every game is a war.

**Will the Talons lose their homefield advantage by moving into the BOK Center?**

It's possible. The noise level in the Convention Center was often deafening, making it hard on visiting teams. The Talons were 70-16 at home in nine seasons. The BOK is more spacious, so the noise level isn't likely to be nearly as high. But co-owner Paul Ross said it might be good for attendance. People who avoided the games in the past because of the noise level might show up now.

**With the parent Arena Football League closing down for a year, how can af2 survive?**

The developmental league is financially independent of the AFL, and af2 president Jerry Kurz stresses that the league has done things from the beginning to keep costs down. AFL executives are in many

his last game for Memphis.

Missouri is among the last eight teams left in the NCAA Tournament in just its third season under Anderson, a Nolan Richardson disciple who coached the last Conference USA team to beat John Calipari's Memphis team — that was for UAB in 2006.

In its fourth straight regional semifinal appearance, Memphis finally turned up the pressure to force a series of turnovers that got the Conference USA champs back in the game.

Shawn Taggart's rebound dunk cut it to 89-83 with 2:14 left, but Zaire Taylor sank two free throws to boost the lead to 91-83. Lyons made two free throws with 1:30 left, then two more with 1:21 to go and it was 95-85.

**Connecticut 72, Purdue 60:** Connecticut hardly needed Hasheem Thabeet as it romped through the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament.

That all changed against a gritty Purdue team. The Boilermakers seemed to have an answer for everything the Huskies threw at them — except for the 7-foot-3 Thabeet.

Thabeet, the Big East coplayer of the year, scored 15 points, had 15 rebounds and blocked four shots, and top-seeded Connecticut overcame a sluggish first half to defeat Purdue in the NCAA West Regional semifinals on Thursday.

"Hasheem just took the

game over," UConn coach Jim Calhoun said. "Purdue, quite frankly, ran into one of the best players in America in Hasheem Thabeet. Beyond that, the game might have been different if we had just, quote, a regular center."

The Huskies advanced to Saturday's West final against third-seeded Missouri, which defeated No. 2 seed Memphis 102-91 in the late game.

It was Thabeet's 18th double-double of the season, and it couldn't have come at a better time for the Huskies.

UConn jumped out to an early 11-point lead, then went cold and let the fifth-seeded Boilermakers (27-10) claw back into the game.

The first half looked like it belonged in a Thanksgiving tournament, not the third round of the NCAAAs.

UConn shot only 39.4 percent from the floor, but it led by five points at intermission because Purdue was even worse (33.3 percent).

No one was colder than UConn's Jeff Adrien, who was 1-for-9 from the floor and missed his only free throw.

The Huskies had won their first two tournament games by an average of 41 points, but it was obvious they were in for a fight against the defense-oriented Boilermakers.

ager, among the optimistic.

"I think people are excited about going, especially those who haven't seen the new setup for football and those who have never experienced a game with all the bells and whistles of the new arena," Bolton said.

Oilers attendance was up nearly 1,200 per game in the recently completed first year in the BOK Center. Tulsa ranked third in attendance in the 17-team Central Hockey League, and Lund was the league's executive of the year.

Ross hopes the optimism is justified because the Talons anticipate a shortfall of up to \$100,000 in sponsorships over last season. The shaky economy explains part of the loss, but another part comes from former Talons partners who are now paying some or all of their promotional funds to the BOK Center, Ross said.

Under their five-year agreement with the city, the Talons are guaranteed \$22,500 per game from premium seating revenue. However, they will net only about \$2,500 per game after paying operational costs estimated at about \$20,000 nightly. Their rental fee alone is \$15,000 per game — 10 times what it was in the

Convention Center Arena.

That adds up to a revenue surplus of \$20,000 over the course of eight home games. What will offset the remainder of the Talons' projected \$100,000 shortfall?

"We're hoping the BOK Center will work for us," Ross said. "We're hoping people who are invited to watch games from the corporate suites will decide to come back and spend their own money."

To spread out the burden, and possibly spark new ideas, Ross and Primeaux have taken on Oklahoma City businessmen Bill Cameron and David Box as partners.

Cameron is Chairman of the Board and CEO of American Fidelity Assurance Company and a part-owner in the Oklahoma City Thunder NBA franchise. Box, who attended Tulsa's Holland Hall prep school from grades seven through 10, founded Box Talent Agency in 1988 and is majority owner of The Greens Country Club in Oklahoma City.

"Paul and Henry have done a great job with this franchise and we're pleased to be a part of it," Box said.
